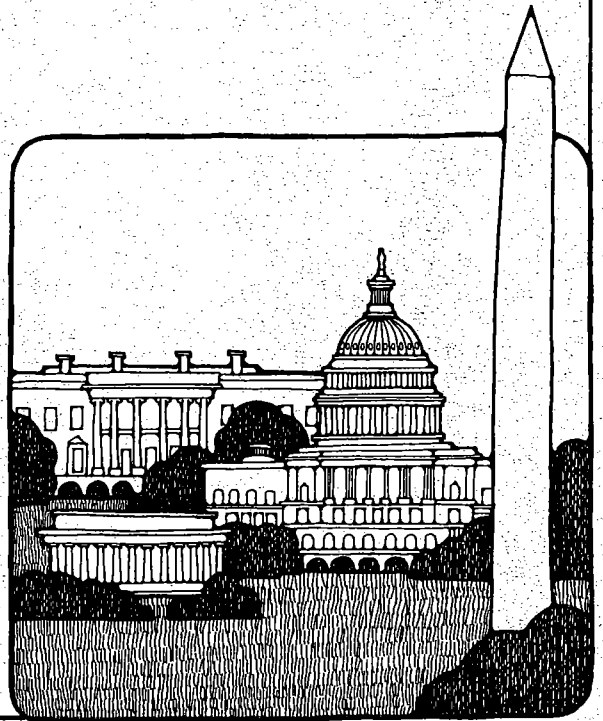

The Purpose

This second national conference in medical education is designed to provide a basic forum for generalists in medical education.

Its purposes are to facilitate our communicating about common concerns, interests and activities; to provide us an opportunity to jointly seek new approaches and creative solutions to problems and issues in medical education; and to promote continuing contacts and working relationships among generalists across the country.

There will be extensive opportunities for individual participation, discussion, sharing of experiences, brain storming, planning and getting acquainted with others who face the same challenges you do.

The Format

During most time periods of the program three sessions will be running concurrently. Because audience involvement in these in-depth sessions is integral, you are encouraged to choose sessions in which you can actively participate. Sessions are generally 90 minutes in length and of three basic types:

Focused Interactive Sessions

A moderator will pose a timely issue for intensive guided discussion in large and small groups.

Descriptive Sessions

Examination of a proposed alternative to an identified problem and discussion of other strategies for dealing with the problem.

Skill Acquisition Sessions

Demonstration of a particular technique and provision of feedback concerning usefulness of the process.

Keynote Speaker



George E. Miller

Keynote speaker for the conference this year is the acknowledged patriarch of all generalists in medical education, *George E. Miller, M.D.* Dr. Miller is a veteran of all aspects of medical education, a proponent of applying the scientific inquiry method to educational endeavors and an engaging speaker.

Dr. Miller and others initiated the first Project in Medical Education at the University of Buffalo in 1955. He has since authored the landmark book *Teaching and Learning in Medical School* and more recently *Educating Medical Teachers*, directed the University of Illinois' Office of Research in Medical Education and the Center for Educational Development, and coordinated the Center's international activities. In 1979 Dr. Miller retired from the medical education scene to provide health care for the student body at Hamilton College in Clinton, New York, as Director of the Rudd Health Center.

Not quite able to set aside old habits, he is now assisting in organizing the College's Health Professions Advisory Committee as they look at the process of pre-professional education.
